## Highlights from 40 publications of

### ON THE BEAT

To mark this milestone, I've looked backed through past editions of our newsletter and collected some of the highlights which will hopefully bring back some fond memories.

Our first publication in the Autumn of 2011 featured a photograph taken of the choir singing at Tyne Cot cemetery in Ypres, Belgium earlier that year. In the April of 2012, a presentation was made to "Help for Heroes" charity of £1900 reminding everyone of the importance of the Choir's commitment to raising funds for charities and worthy causes. In July of that year KPMVC joined forces with Thanet Male Voice Choir for a Gala concert in Cliftonville. Moving on to 2013, in March the choir performed at St. Helen's Church in Cliffe and were delighted to find that Jools Holland was in the audience; in a conversation with George Rogers, he mentioned how impressed he was with the singing. After the concert, George wrote to Mr Holland inviting him to become a patron on the choir which he agreed to do and remains in this role to this day. If you don't ask....

The Autumn edition of 2013 featured the choir's memorable trip to the Moselle Valley in Germany. Organised by John Pearce, 47 members of the choir and their partners travelled to this region, enjoyed some sight-seeing and wine tasting before joining with the Mannerchor 1878 for a concert in the Matthaskappelle, Kobern-Gondorf. In October, another concert with Thanet Male Voice Choir, this time in Maidstone, which raised in excess of £7,000 for The Heart of Kent Hospice and Demelza. In 2014 there were the usual concerts around the county, including at Rochester Baptist church in June. Organised by ex-Superintendent Ken Tappenden MBE, the concert raised funds for Macmillan Cancer Support in memory of his daughter Janita who lost her battle with cancer some years previously. In July the choir said farewell to longstanding choir member John Vowles and his wife Shirley who moved to Wales (and continue to enjoy life there). On the Beat featured greetings from John and Shirley in their new home. The Spring edition of 2015 featured the launch in the previous December of the choir's new CD "A moment in Time" recorded at Godmersham Church.

Jumping forward to June 2016, another trip for the Choir, to Essex. We were invited to sing with the Essex police choir at St Luke's Church in Tiptree. In July, a friendly match of "stoolball" took place in Ashford against our friends from Thanet MVC who were the victors on that occasion. In December, 20 members of the choir made an early morning trip to Radio Kent's studios in Tunbridge Wells to sing a few Christmas songs and bring some Christmas cheer to the listeners. June 3<sup>rd</sup> 2017 was an important date for our accompanist Karen Barton as it was her wedding to Luke Holman and the choir were privileged to be invited to sing at the service in St. Peter's Church, Boughton Monchelsea. It took many months for our MD Martin to adjust to Karen's newly married status when he introduced her at concerts under her now married name of Barton-Holman! If you were in Herne Bay on 30<sup>th</sup> July, you might have witnessed choir singing on the pier on what was a very windy day! In November of 2017, the choir shared the stage at Rochester Cathedral with *Revelation Strings*.









2018 was the choir's 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year and there were many events to celebrate this remarkable achievement. "40 years of Singing" was the mantra throughout the year which included a Cream Tea in May, an Anniversary Concert at St Mildred's Tenterden in July, a trip to Ypres in September to sing at the Menin Gate, and a 3-choirs concert also in September at the Winter Gardens, Margate. 2018 also saw the launch of the choir's "Young Artist's Programme" which aims to give young musicians and singers an opportunity to perform in front of an audience outside of the school environment. In February 2019, our MD put together a concert featuring some of these young artists at St Michael's Village Hall in Tenterden. *On the Beat* has featured profiles on some of these performers to give our readers an insight into their musical journey.

The first edition of 2020 highlighted the Christmas concert in December 2019 at the Wurlitzer Academy with its spotlight on the Wurlitzer organ (as well as KPMVC's singing, of course!). None of us need reminding of the events in 2020 which completely shut down all choirs and, indeed, public singing of any kind. On the Beat was not thwarted by this temporary suspension of activities and produced, in May, a "lockdown" edition and several of our regular contributors rose to the occasion with some amusing and poignant anecdotal stories. A bumper edition in September 2021 featured a report from our chairman, George, as to how the choir had coped during the lockdown months and had, in fact, managed to keep singing (in small groups) once the restrictions allowed. So all was not lost and rehearsals resumed in full in August 2021. There were several noteworthy events in 2022. The first was the choir's new uniform - the headline in the July edition was "It's a marmite thing," which probably still aptly describes how folk feel about substituting the dress uniforms, bow ties and cummerbunds, for a more "casual" shirt and jumper. Some love it, some not so much. The second event of 2022 was the choir's trip to Brecon to sing with the Brecon Male Voice choir. The trip was brilliantly documented by Geoff Fisher in a special supplement for On the Beat. The October edition was dedicated to Queen Elizabeth II. Choir members were asked to contribute their memories of meeting the Queen and other members of the royal family and their stories were a joy to read. The edition also included the photoshoot for the new (and latest) official photograph.

And so, to 2023. The first publication in March, paid tribute on its front page to David Vening following his death just before Christmas 2022. David conducted the choir for 28 years before retiring in 2010 handing over the baton to our current MD, Martin Rendle.







Over the 40 editions of this newsletter, we have also commemorated far too many choir members who have died — Paul Cox, Peter Barlow, Raymond Butt, Tony Wheatley, Pat Keast, Alf Ruck, Chris Longfield, Mick Williams, David Vening and Charles Hitchcock. We've also featured many, many stories and anecdotes from choir members, both past and present which have entertained and amused and also included quite a lot of photographic evidence of the choir's activities, concerts and memorable occasions.

I've enjoyed this brief trip down memory lane and was surprised to see that we are not only on our 40<sup>th</sup> edition, but in our 12<sup>th</sup> year. Quite an achievement and I would like to personally thank those of you who have regularly contributed your stories and anecdotes – I dare not risk naming names in case I miss someone out, but you know who you are and how much your contributions are appreciated. Keep them coming!



# Young Musicians Programme

## ~ Tara Vidal von Ronn ~

At our concert on 30<sup>th</sup> September at St Nicholas Church, St Nicholas-at-Wade, the choir was proud to introduce another young musician, Tara Vidal von Ronn. Tara sang 'Far from the home I love' by Jerry Bock & Sheldon Harnick from the musical 'Fiddler On The Roof' and 'We'll Gather Lilacs In The Spring' by Ivor Novello from the musical 'Perchance to Dream'. Here Tara tells *On The Beat* about her musical journey.

Firstly, tell us a bit about yourself, do you come from a musical family?

My grandmother has always been the musical one of my family- but her living in Germany meant that it was left up to me to exterminate silence in my home in Ramsgate, where I live with my parents and two younger siblings. I hold the long-standing position of family dinner DJ and have been musical for as long as I can remember.

What was your introduction to music and what do you like listening to?

My childhood was scored by U2, the Pet Shop Boys, Depeche mode, Aha... I rebuked anything that wasn't Heart 80's radio until age 11. Much to the distaste of my childhood self, I have since caught the contemporary pop bug (as personified by Taylor Swift) and love all genres, with particularly soft spots for French rap and Spanish flamenco fusion. Not forgetting classical- a love for which my dad propagates through persistent, ceaseless, Classic FM.

When did you start singing lessons and do you play any musical instruments?

It was at age 9 that I first started saxophone lessons as inspired by my two profoundly musical best friends and only in my penultimate year of Chatham and Clarendon Grammar School that I have begun singing lessons. I am always singing, but for approximately 40

minutes every week the wonderful Martin is there to tell me that I am doing it wrong (for this I am thankful).

You seemed very confident in front of an audience, was this your first public performance?

Now in my final year, almost too much of my free time is employed weekly by senior wind band, jazz band, choir and CCGS' Advanced Vocal Ensemble (AVE). It is a harmonious community to belong to; giving me many opportunities for public performances on even an international scale. Still, very excitingly, this has been my first solo singing performance! It is entirely due to the Young Artists Programme that this was possible, for which I am extremely grateful. It has proved to be an overwhelmingly positive experience (not to mention the flowers!) and boost of self-esteem for someone like me who has never truly thought of themselves as a 'singer.'

What are your plans for future study and where do you hope that will take you in the future?

In the future, I hope desperately to study International Relations at the London School of Economics where I will learn more about politics, history, language, and macroeconomics to unite the people of the world in much the same way as music does.



The KPMVC has, since 1978, a proud tradition of raising monies for charities and good causes in Kent. In this our 45th year we are very close to raising our first half a million pounds for the benefit of those good causes.

The choir itself is a registered charity and our rationale is only possible through the generosity, support, and good will of the many who give of their time and money which in turn is used to enable us to reach the audiences and communities we perform for thus raising much needed support for them.

The choir has, of course, to financially support itself; but in general, uses the vast majority of its income for others. It is a fact that during the Covid years our expenditure remained constant while we rehearsed (in increasing number as the conditions allowed) but our income stream slid to a halt. We found it necessary to seek and thankfully obtain support in the form of grants, sponsorship and good will from a variety of philanthropic sources for which we remain indebted. We can ironically only support others by being supported ourselves.

One such example of philanthropic kindness was highlighted during our concert at Sandhurst in west Kent on 11th November. Our chairman explained to the audience that a local author, Pam Mills, had approached the choir twelve months previously asking if she could donate monies to the choir - we of course accepted her very kind offer. Pam a former Police Officer and magistrate had written a book entitled 'Prevention, Detection and Keepers of the Peace' (policing Tonbridge a Division of the Kent Police). Once costs had been taken care of Pam donated

profits from the sale of her book to our choir. Initially we imagined we may gain a few pounds. After a year of publicising and selling her book, the choir have benefit from upwards of one thousand pounds! A huge amount. We are extremely grateful for Pam's generosity and support - it has made a big difference.

At the concert our chairman George Rogers presented Pam with a bouquet of flowers as a token of that appreciation.

We thank Pam and every other supporter for their continued support. Here's to us raising our first million pounds!!



And whilst on the subject of generosity, we should acknowledge the support of the Friends of the Choir who have contributed over £2300 since its launch.

Also grateful thanks to Pressure Welding Machines Ltd. who have generously agreed to sponsor the hire cost of the rehearsal room for another year.
